## **Pro-Poor**



I have recently had the opportunity to present in several places and to several different people about what Love Must Act is and does. I found myself relying on an expression we don't use in the United States, but that South Africans use all the time. It is to describe something as "pro-poor." The most interesting thing about this expression to me is how much it grabs peoples' attention and stirs their imaginations, maybe because it sounds so strange to us. I find myself using it more and more.

It is, in fact, in the opening words of the mission statement of Holy Cross School in Makhanda, South Africa, our primary project. Holy Cross is a school founded to serve the poor and administered with that in mind. It's why we honor that our students do not speak English at home and so we teach both in their indigenous language, isiXhosa, and introduce more and more English, the language of economic success, in the later grades. It's why we recognize that we have to

provide services in school that non-poor students might not have trouble accessing from home. Medical and dental care, HIV testing, occupational therapy, are examples. It's why we take special care to make sure our students have books, both at school and at home, which might not otherwise be there. It's why we pay attention to teaching about nutrition and growing food on small parcels of land typical in the townships.

But as much as being pro-poor is something we do for the benefit of our students, it is even more something we do for ourselves. It is, I believe, the lesson of the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats (Mt. 25:31-46). It is, on the one hand, a parable of judgment, and that judgment relates to how one responds to the poor. Those who give food and drink to those in need, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit those in prison are eternally blessed. "Come, you that are blessed by my Father," the king says, "inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world" (v. 34). Those who fail to do the same things are condemned. "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels."

The passage is about more than the care of the poor, the doing of right or the not doing of right. It is about much more than judgment. It is about something that goes to the very heart of faith, of what matters most. It is about how one encounters God in the flesh, Jesus (whether or not that's the name one uses). Those who cared for the hungry, the stranger, the naked, the sick, the imprisoned among the least have done no less than the same to Jesus, he said (v. 40). It is the same with those who did not. They have neglected Jesus himself. It's not so much about moral behavior and immoral behavior. It is about bringing out in ourselves that which makes us most human, what I would call Jesus, others would call by another name, and some would call by no name. It is of the utmost importance not because it's right but because it makes for the fullest possible life.

The pro-poor attitude of Love Must Act is about making for the fullest possible life for all of us. It is about encountering Jesus in the flesh. That is exactly who we believe we meet in the children of Holy Cross School.
